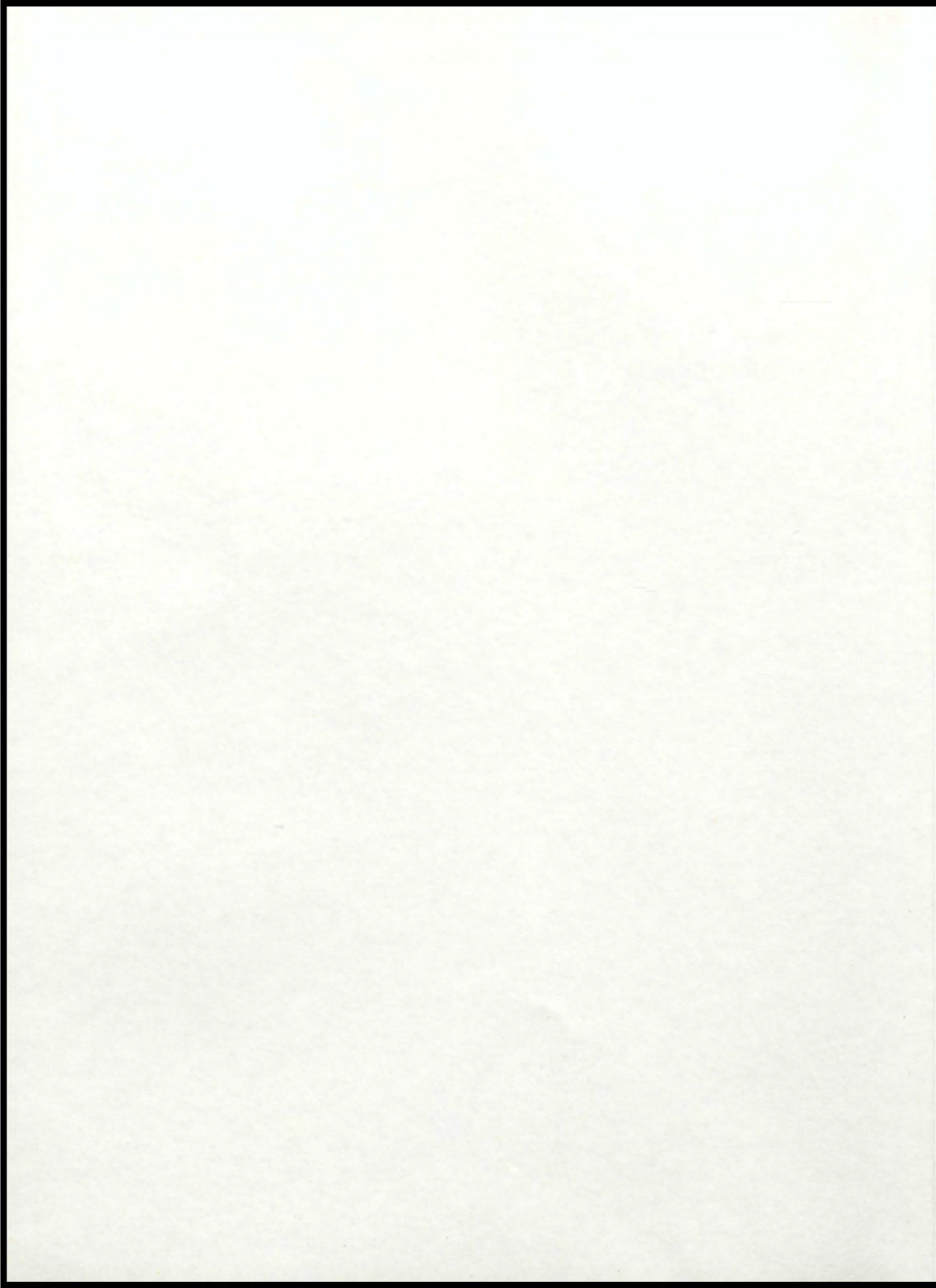

the varsity cheerleaders followed their tradition by going to competition in Nashville, Tennessee.

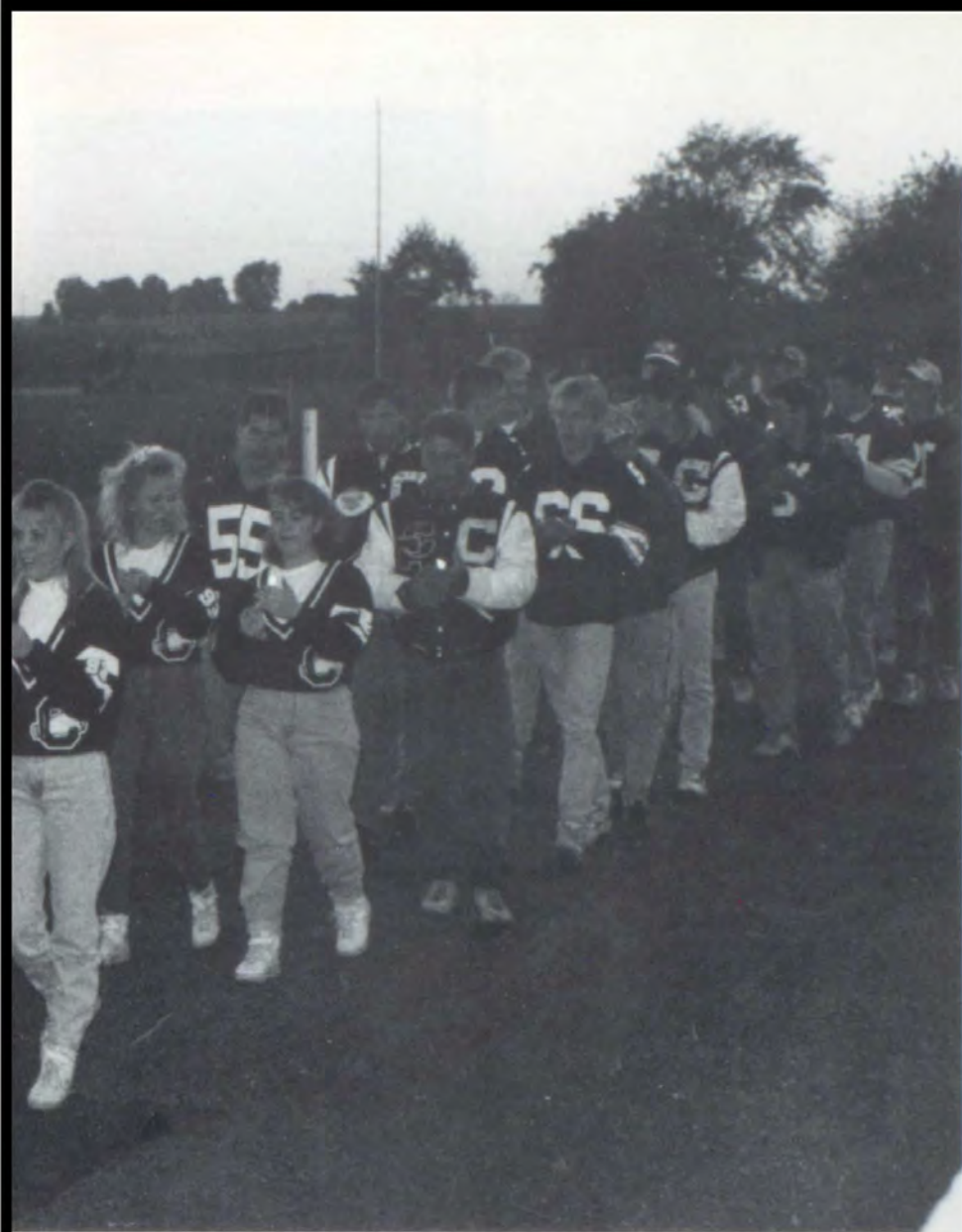

The FHA-FFA Sadie Hawkins dance was held on Saturday, March 14 from 8-11 p.m. in the high school gym.

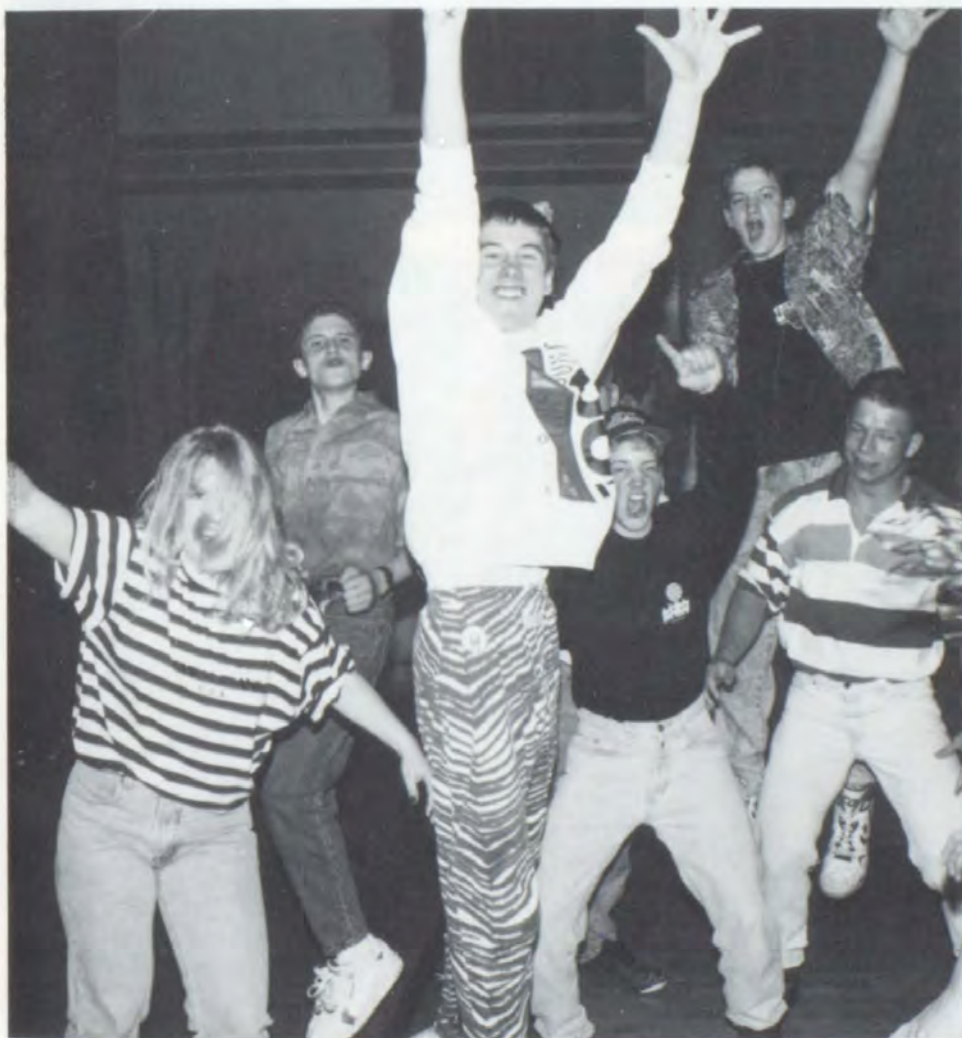

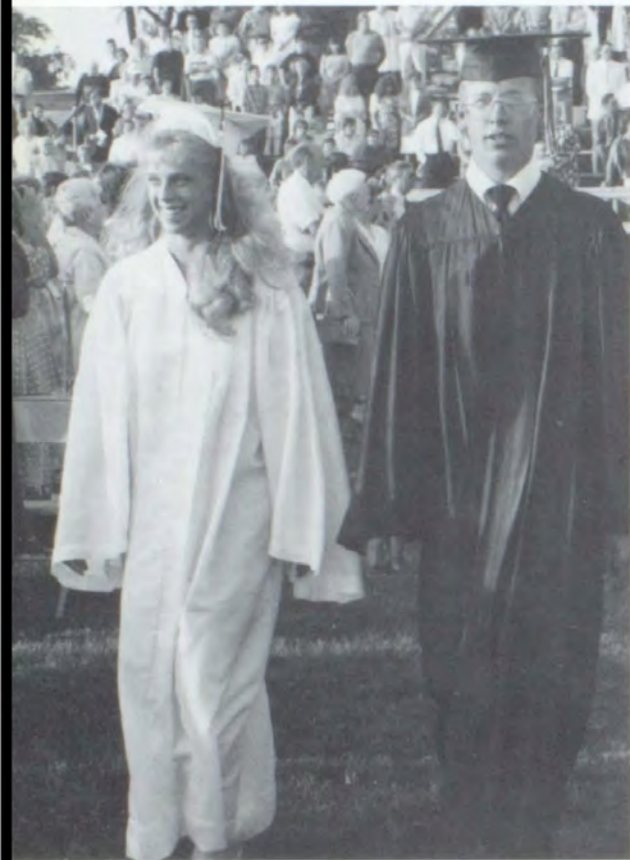

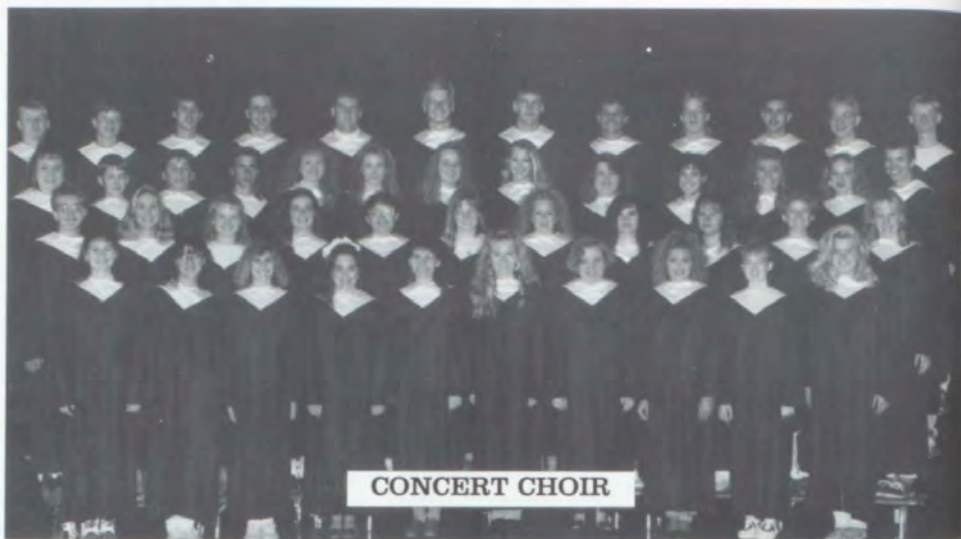

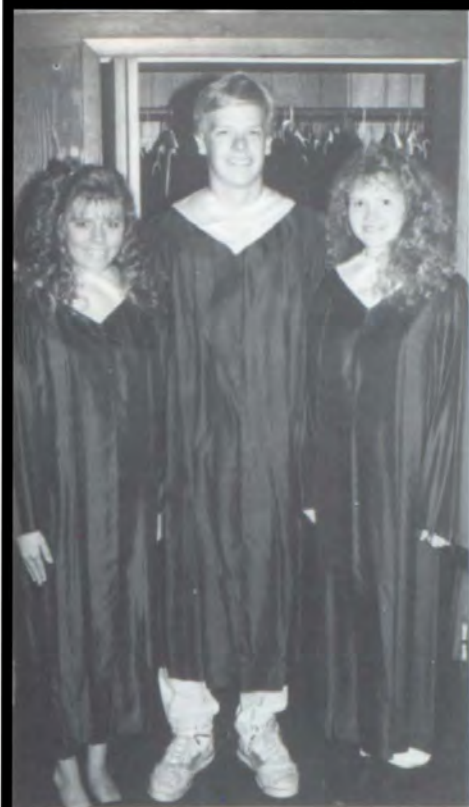

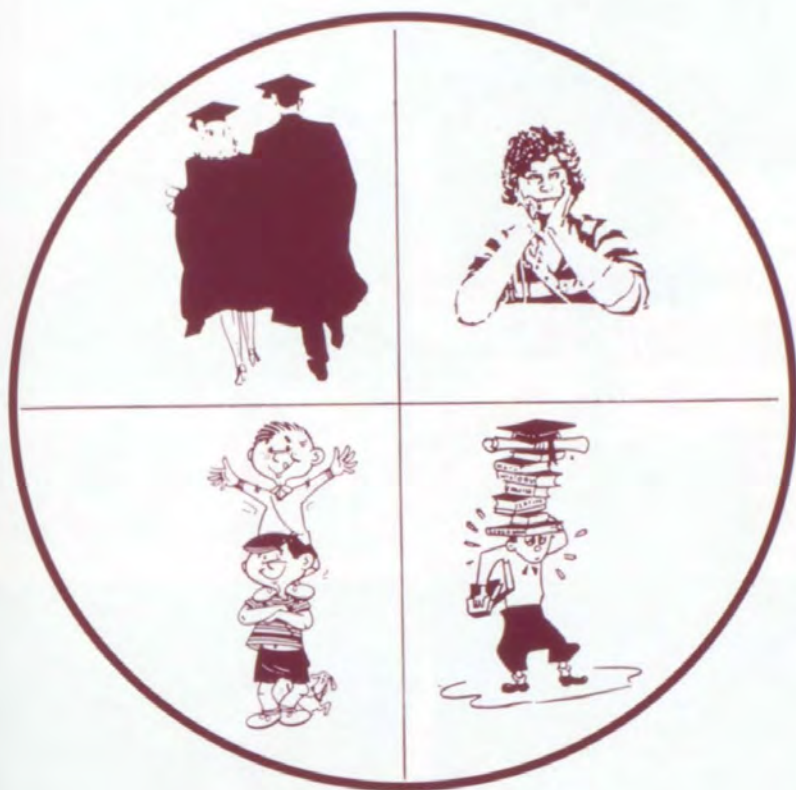

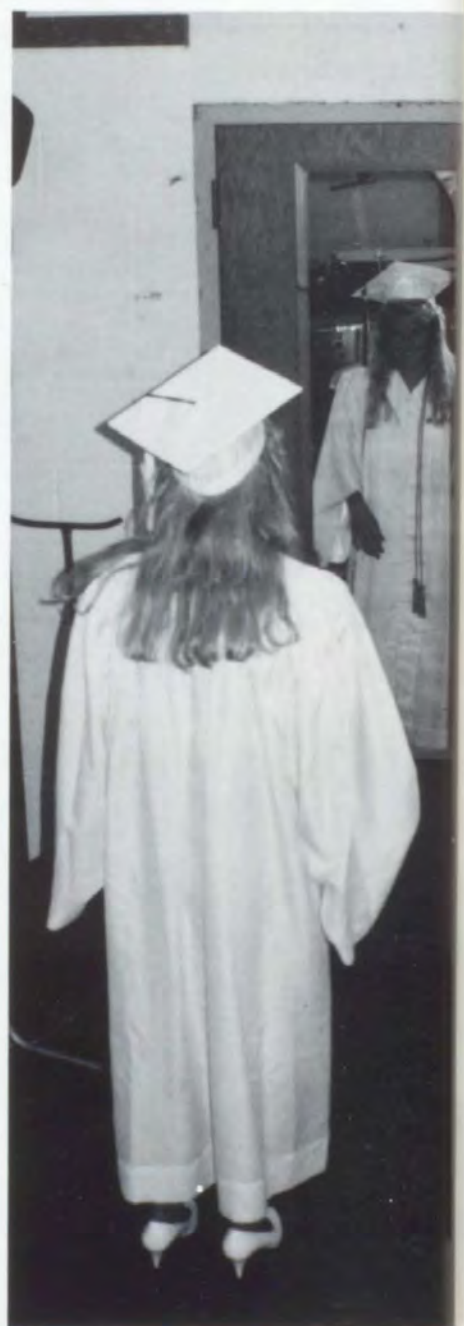

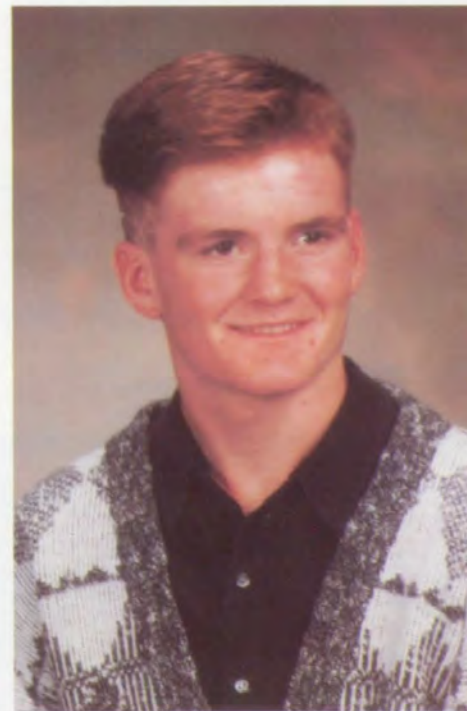

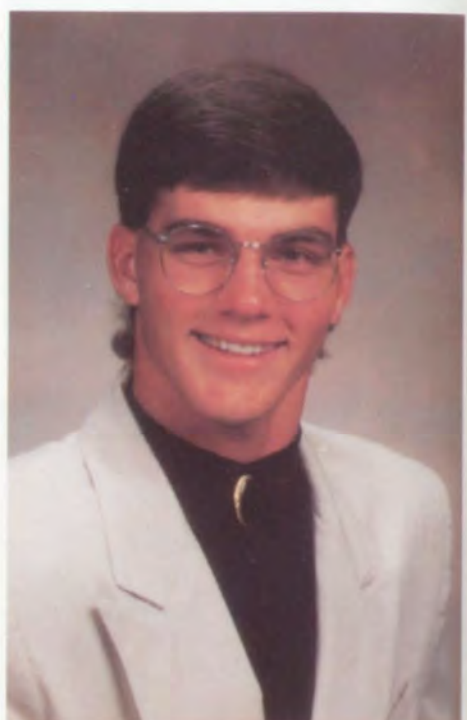

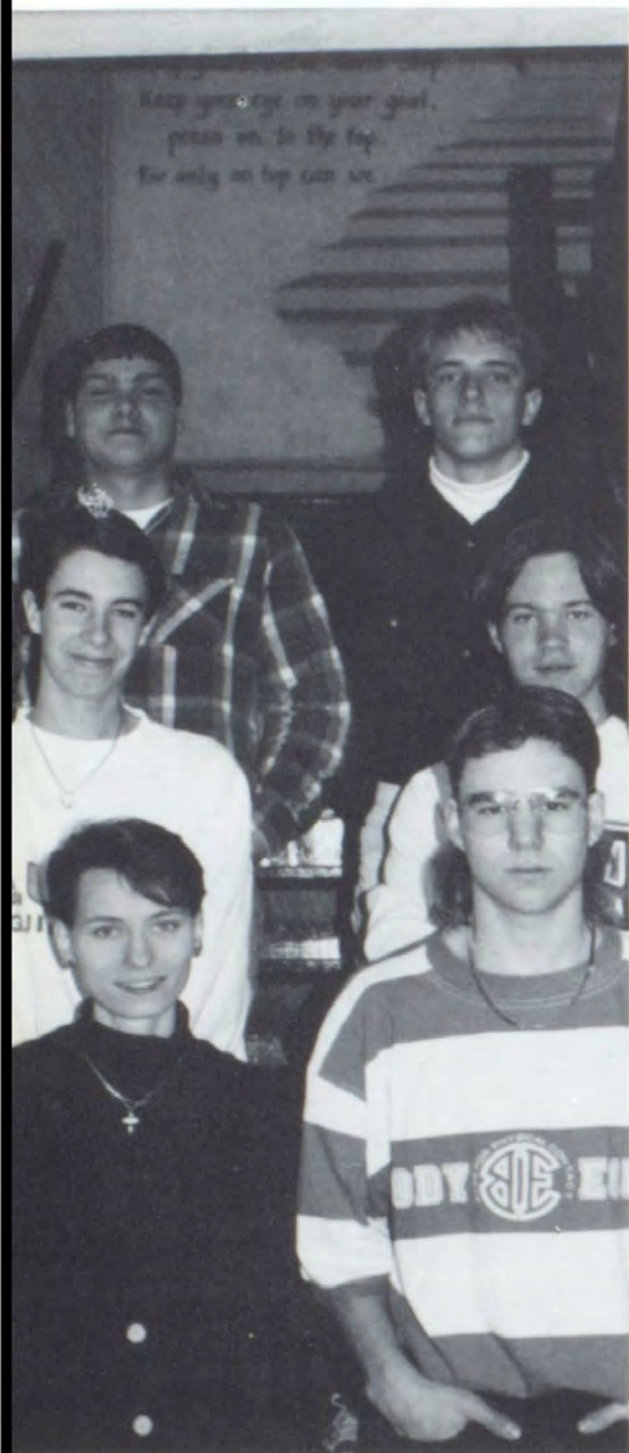

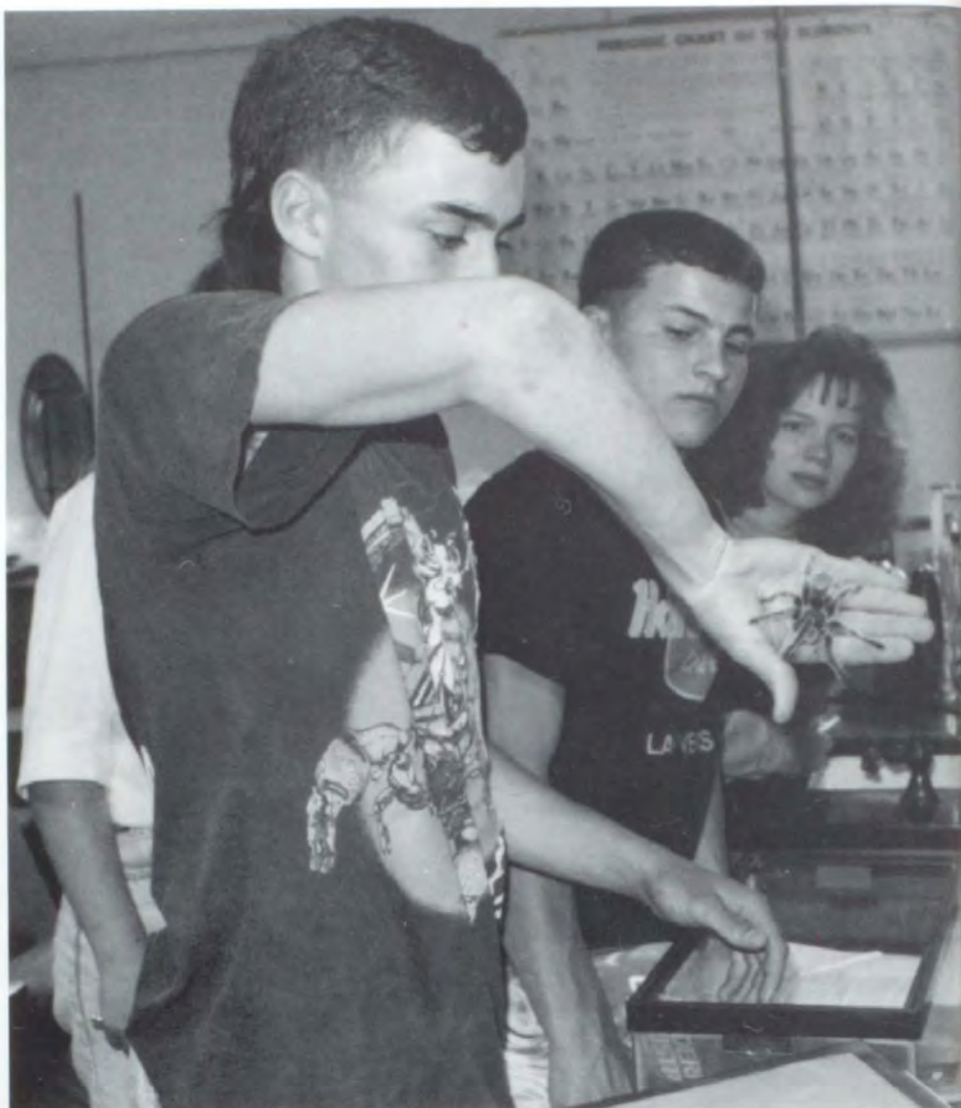

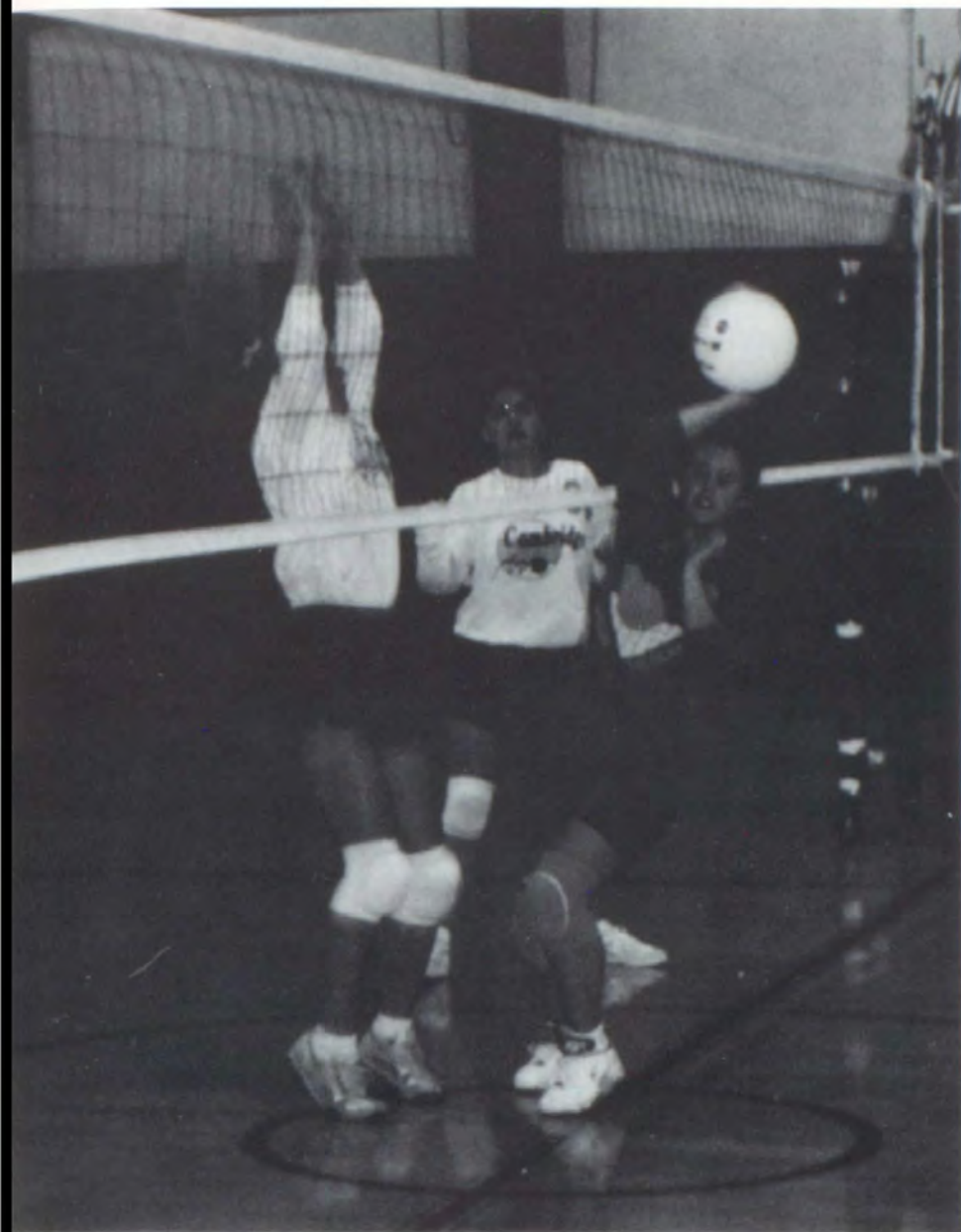

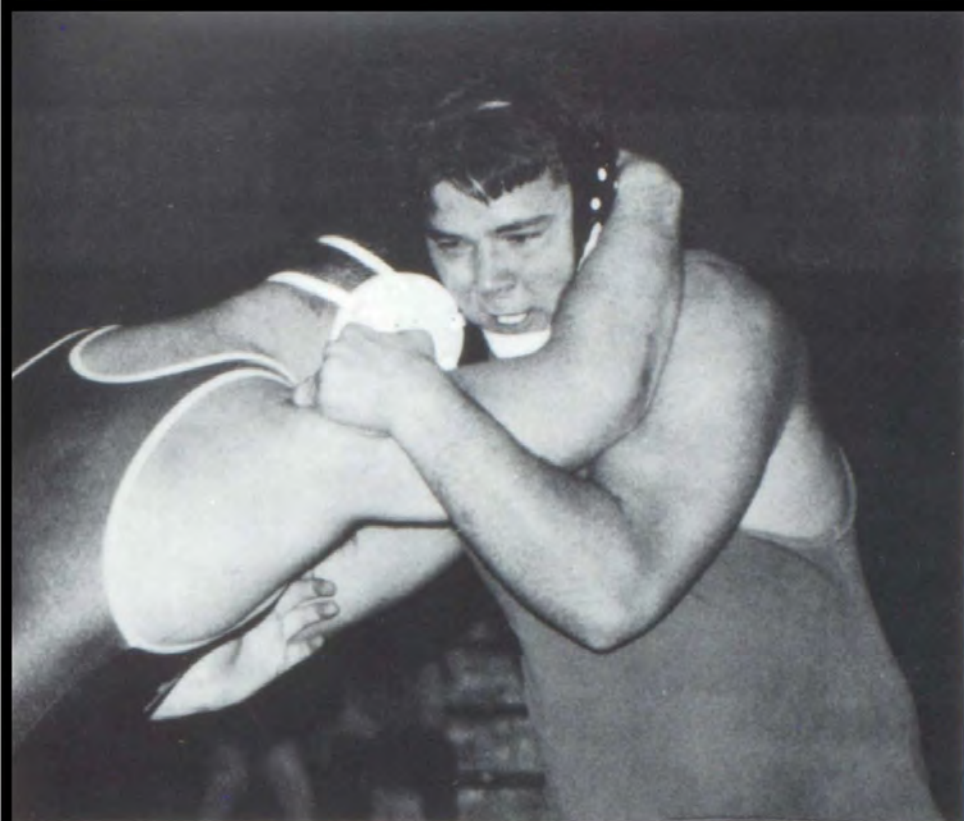

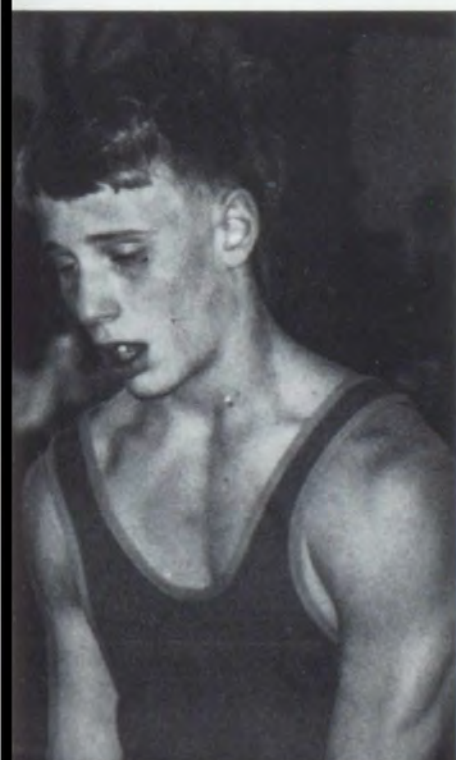
