

FOOTBALL

Cambridge 26 — New Windsor 6

The opening game of the 1949-50 season against New Windsor, the small but hard hitting Vikings, overpowered the Norsemen to win the first game in the Viking Stadium. Robinson, a Viking end, went over for two touchdowns. Metz and Hayes each added a counter, and Mosher completed the score by making a conversion.

Cambridge 20 — Orion 22

In the second conference game of the season, Cambridge was defeated by the oversized Orion Chargers. Although greatly outweighed man for man, the Cambridge sextet came within two points of their opponents and gave them the biggest score of the season. During the battle of this game our spirited Captain, Ervin Robinson, incurred a knee injury that affected him the rest of the season. Blair, a native of Orion, who in his freshman year moved to Cambridge, led the scoring with three T.D.'s while Mosher scored two points on a conversion.

Cambridge 31 — Viola 6

After losing to Orion, we returned home to meet Viola, a small but very fast team. Metz scored four touchdowns and Hayes added another. Metz also scored another point on the conversion.

Cambridge 49 — Sherrard 20

In this game we went to Sherrard and were greatly surprised at their power. In the first half we were but a few points ahead, but when the second half was resumed, we pulled out ahead for a victory. The scoring was

fairly even, with Blair scoring three T.D.'s, Metz 2, and Johnson another. Mosher made two kicks, and Metz scored two additional points, both on conversions.

Cambridge 48 — Williamsfield 25

In this game everyone played except our mascot. The Williamsfield team, who had just started playing football this year, didn't have the experience of the Vikings. Hayes and Blair each scored two T.D.'s, and Johnson, Bork, and Gregory each added one. Mosher made two kicks, and Metz, who played very little because of a weak knee, made two points.

Cambridge 40 — Alwood 20

In this game we journeyed to Alpha, and played in a hard rain. The rainfall was so severe that the game was stopped at one time. We showed our ability to play even in bad weather and went on to beat Alwood with Metz scoring four touchdowns, Blair two, and Mosher completing it by making two conversions.

Cambridge 12 — Atkinson 6

This game proved to be one of the toughest contests of the year. It was at this time that Jerry Metz, our stalwart half-back, was knocked unconscious for a time, this putting him out of the game. Vincent, our end, scored his first touchdown of the year, and Blair added the second.

Cambridge 20 — Hillsdale 27

In our last game of the year with Hillsdale, we missed two of our regulars, Jerry Metz and Ervin Robinson, as the final score showed. Johnson scored two touchdowns, Blair another, and Mosher made a kick for two points, thus ending the 1949-1950 football season with six wins and two losses.

BASKETBALL

The Cambridge Vikings completed the 1949-1950 season with 17 wins and 10 losses and tied for third place in the Cornbelt Conference with Alwood. Returning lettermen from the 1948-49 season were only three: Jerry Metz, Forrest Hayes, and Donald Mosher, all three of whom proved very valuable on our '49-'50 team. The boys coming up to complete our first six men were Ray Bjork, Hal Dean Vincent, and John Blair.

The outstanding game of the season was a conference game played in Viola. Viola led the scoring up until two minutes before the game was over, although at times it was very close. With two minutes left in the game and Viola leading the Vikings by nine points, it seemed like a sure loss for the latter team, but the spirited Cambridge quintet did not give up so easily. Holding the home team to only one bucket and a gift throw, the visitors tallied thirteen points in the remaining time to win the game.
