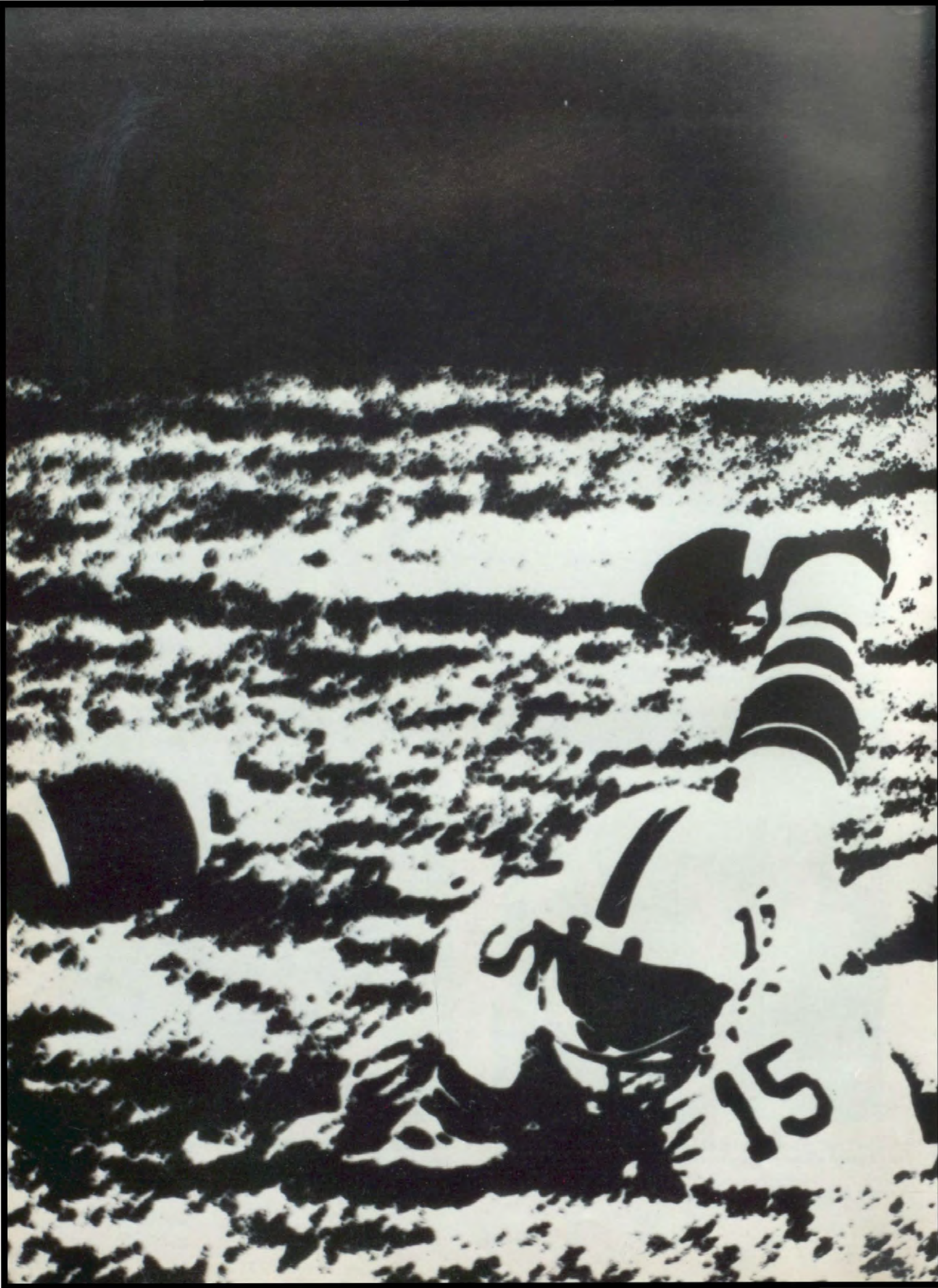

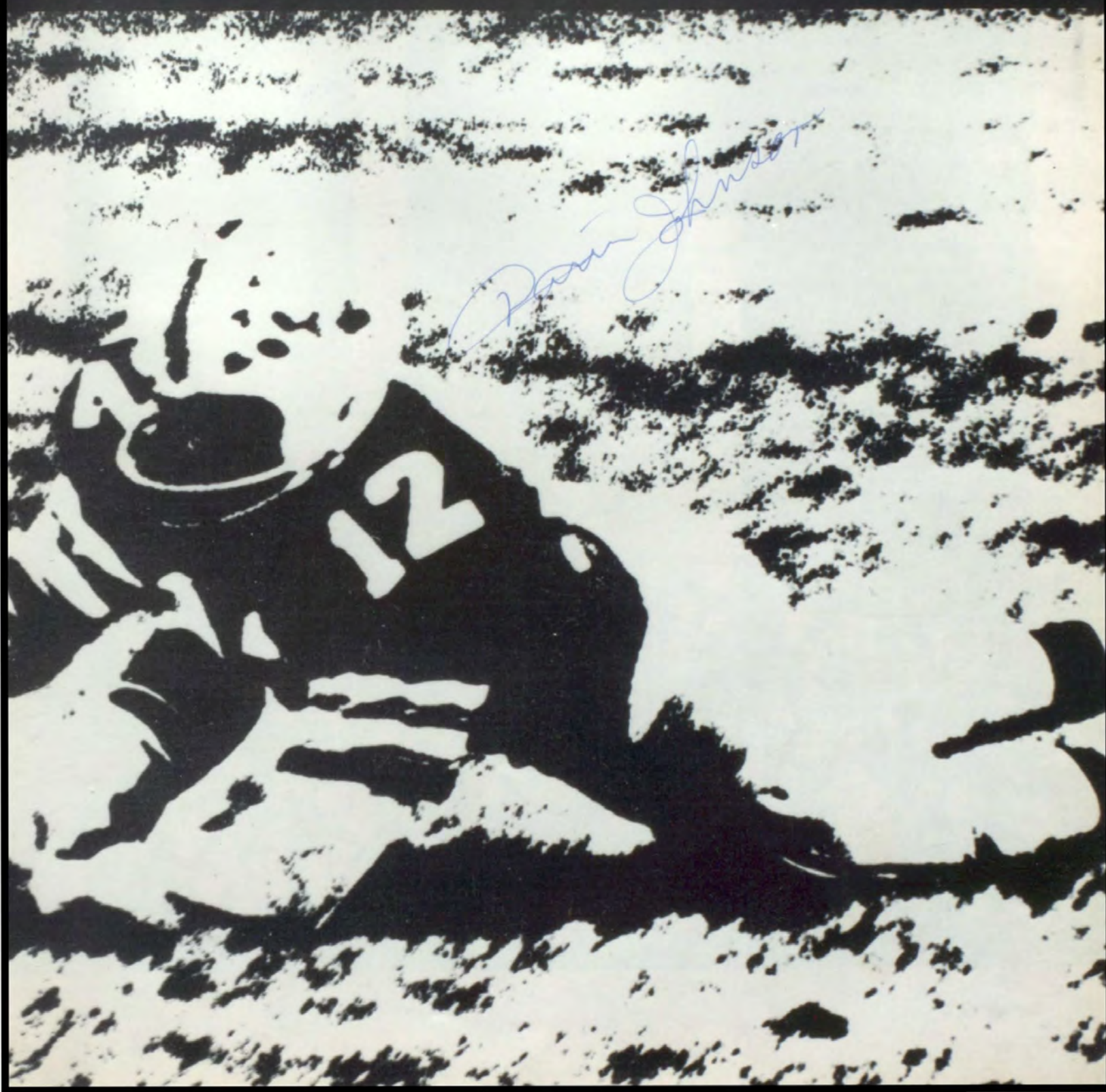

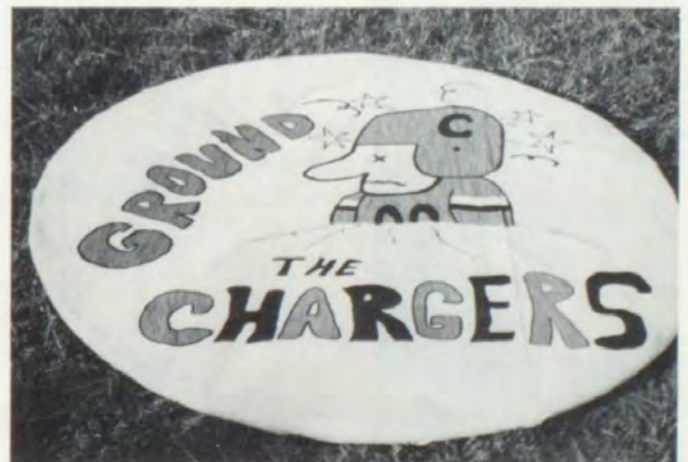

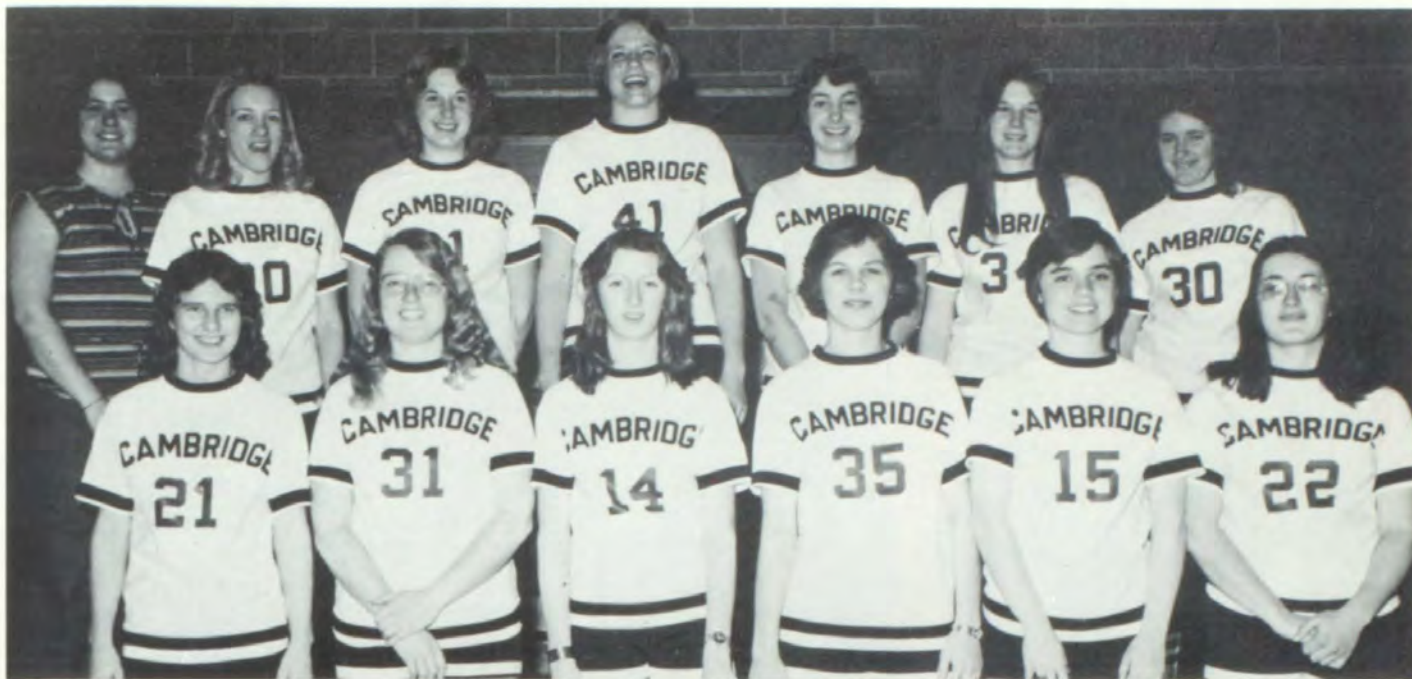

The freshman general science course is designed to give the students a basic understanding of the physical sciences. Biology I gives the student an opportunity to study and better understand the living things around him. Five courses in mathematics are offered, and one year of mathematics is the minimum requirement for graduation. Courses offered are Practical Mathematics, Algebra I, Algebra II, Geometry, and College Mathematics.

## ENGLISH AND HISTORY

The English department at CHS is concerned with the skills of communicating: reading, writing, speaking, and listening. The program is designed to combine these skills whenever possible so that the student has the opportunity to express himself as well as study the self-expression of others. A combined required- elective course system is used, with the mandatory courses being English I and II, to be taken the first two years. Following these courses, in which the basics of literature and composition are stressed, the student is free to receive his remaining credits from a variety of elective courses, each concentrating in a particular area of study. This system is hopefully beneficial to the student by requiring knowledge of the basics, while at the same time allowing for choice in desired areas of interest.

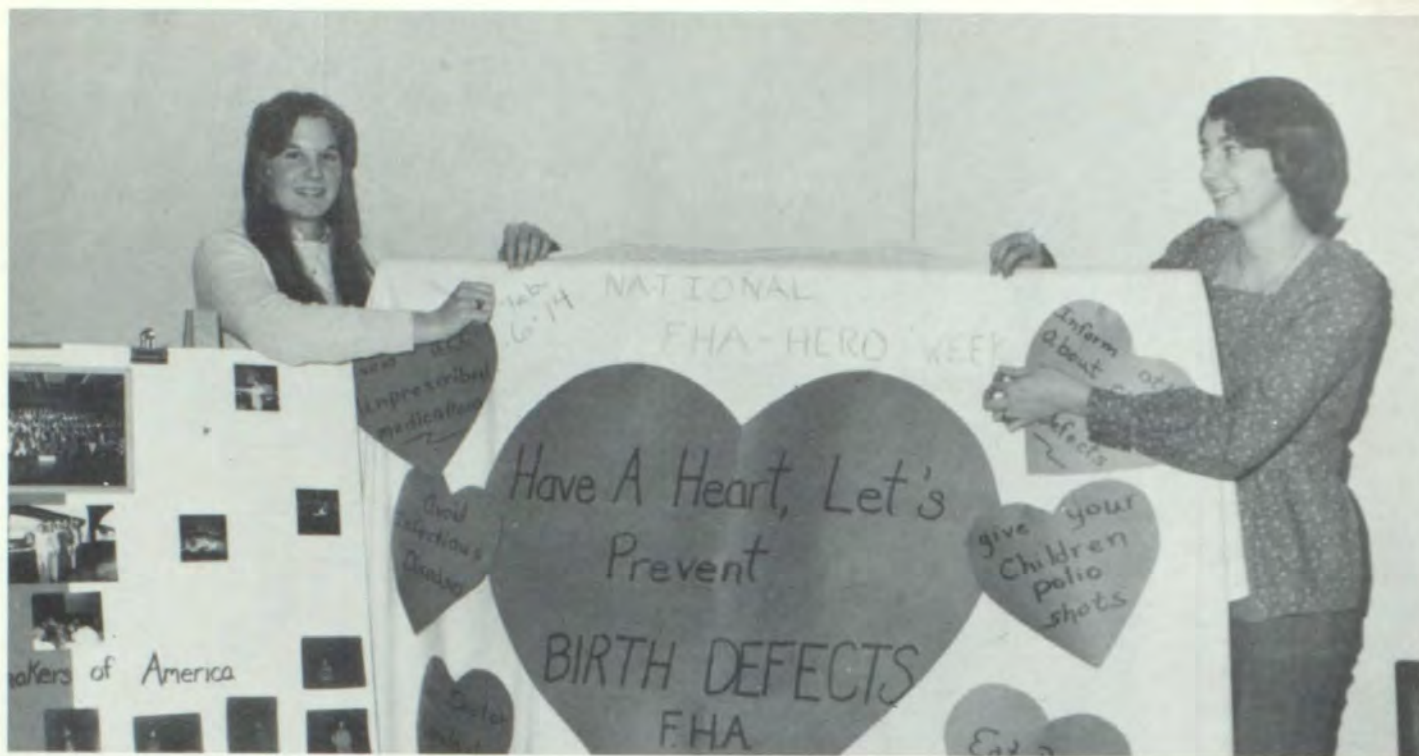
