## FOOTBALL

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The '46-'47 football season started out with great promise for the CCHS football team. They opened the season with a win over Sherrard on their home field. The game was weak defensively for both teams but the Vikings cashed in on their breaks to win 42-8.

After their promising start the Cambridge team dropped its next two games to Alpha and Woodhull by scores of $50-6$ and $50-0$ respectively.

In their fourth game, the Vikings lost to Atkinson 55-6. They were hampered considerably by the loss of three of their starting lineup.

Cambridge staged their comeback in an almost entirely defensive game against New Windsor by a score of 12-8.

The next two games with Orion and Prophetstown were both losses for Cambridge. In the Orion game the score was close for the first half but then Orion took a big advantage in the start of the second half which was too big for the Vikings to overcome.

## BASKETBALL

The Cambridge Viking basketball season was the least successful for many years, having a record of 4 wins and 21 losses.

There were times during the season when the team looked like it might whip into form and become tournament contenders but they couldn't seem to pull out of their slump. The first win on the Viking record came with the third game of the season. Cambridge met their age-old rivals-Orion. It was a well played game and the score, 41-39, reversed the decision of an Orion-Cambridge game the preceding season. The next three games netted two victories and a .1000 per cent in the conference standings.

The Vikings then dropped into their untimely slump and never pulled out again until they met Alpha at the Alpha gym late in the season.

There were times during the season when Cambridge proved that they had some real basketball ability. Advantages were gained on their opponents but they were unable to follow them through.

The closest game played by the Vikings all season was the Geneseo game played on the home floor. The visitors gained the decision of one point in the last seconds of play by a free throw by Fassett. The final score was 33-32.
