As you can see from this picture of the tug-of-war, jeans were worn tight at the bottom, rolled above the ankle, and socks disappeared from many students wardrobes.









The 1988 Varsity Football team is one that will long be remembered. Their outstanding season brought the school and town together. Their desire and intensity attracted many spectators and their play was never a letdown. The undeniable speed of the running backs and the hard hitting sturdiness of the linemen led them to a #1 state ranking. They finished the year with a 9-1 record and were 6-0 for an undefeated Lincoln Trail conference crown. For the fourth year in a row they qualified for the Class 1A Playoffs, where they lost by 1 point to an undefeated Annawan squad in the opening game. The Vikes dominated the all-conference offensive ream this year with 6 first ream picks: Howard Dennis, Doug Schehl, Blake Reed, Bryce Reed, Terry Anderson, and kicker Andy Patterson. Three Vikings were named to the first team defense: Darren McDonough, Derick Hicks, and Bryce Reed while three more players received honorable mention: Travis Schnowske, Terry Anderson, and Corey Schmoll.





























With the arrival of spring and track season, at the end of the year, all the freshmen were looking forward to becoming Sophomores next fall and having someone else be low man on the totem pole.










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Administration and Staff






