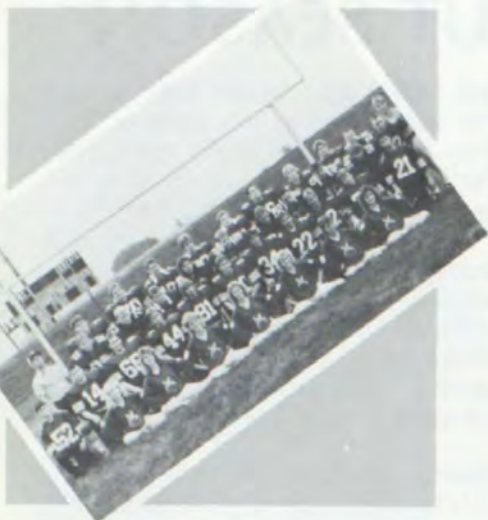

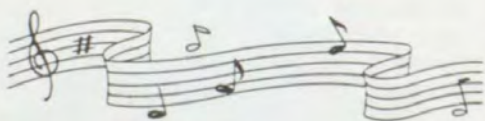

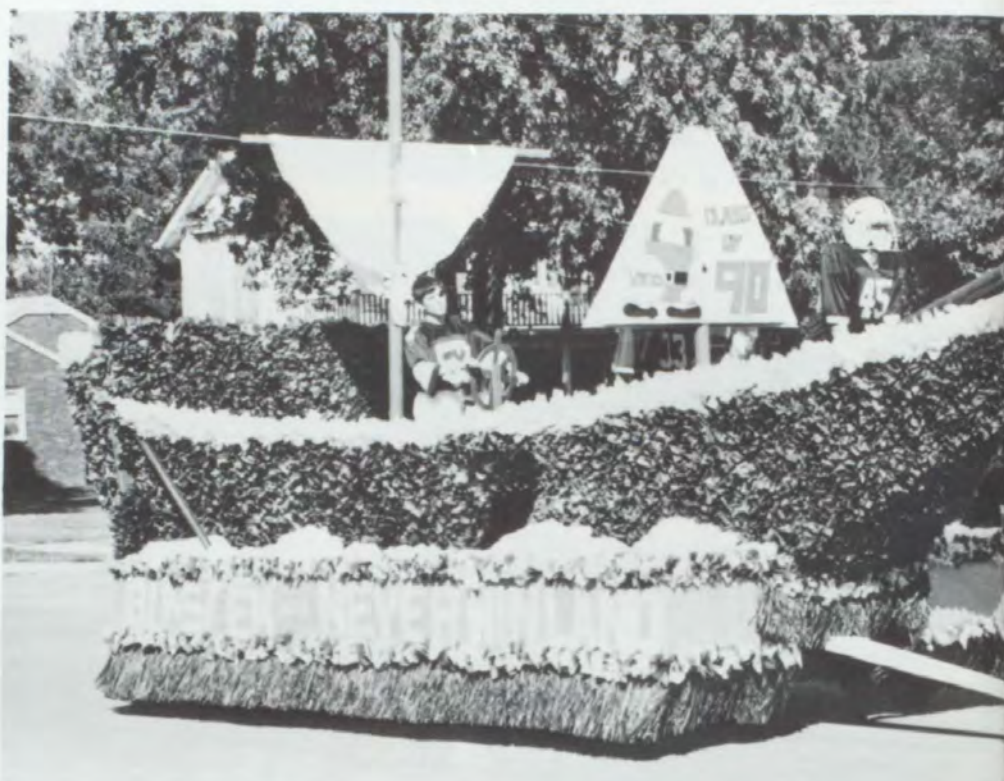

# AT SECTIONALS



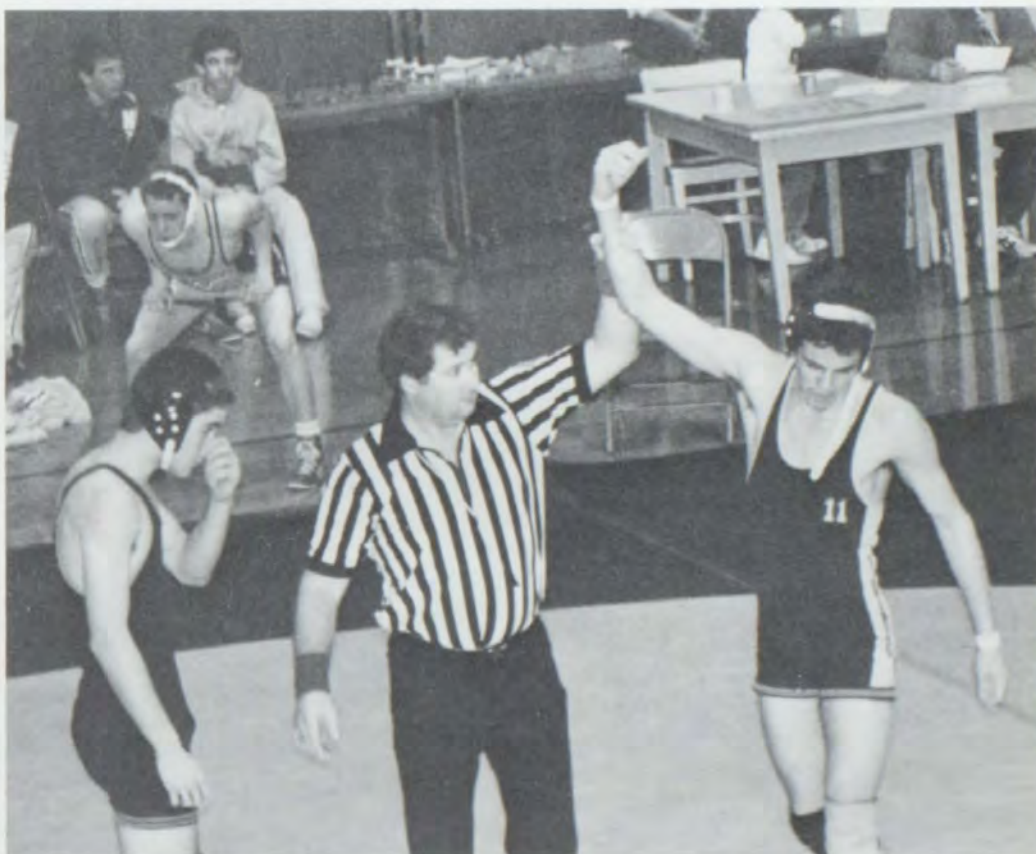
Although the wrestling team didn't have as many wins as last year, they managed to fill all weight classes. In order to do this, many wrestlers went on strict diets. Freshmen found that their first year of wrestling was really tough. They had to learn how to maintain a good mental attitude in order to win matches.

One freshman, along with his brother, a junior, made it to sectionals as alternates. A junior and a senior made it to sectionals to wrestle. Even though they didn't go any farther, they gained much experience for the future. The freshman, Brady Stromquist, set a new record for the fastest pin at the 105 weight class. He did it in 28 seconds. His brother, Kyle Stromquist, a junior, set a new school record for wins at the 132 weight class with nineteen wins. Kyle missed his own single season record of escapes by one and is two short of the career record. Terry Anderson, a junior, set a new record for the most wins at the 126 weight class with twenty-three wins.

Terry set a new single season record with 139.5 team points. Terry is 3rd in career team points. # TRACK YIELDS CONFERENCE

The Vikings began their track season with high hopes. At the beginning, practices were held in the gym and consisted of running halls, various training stations, and lifting weights. As the weather got nicer and competition drew near, practices moved outside. The teammates ran on the track, to the cemetery, and practiced field events.

The girls team was well-rounded; there was strong support from the runners and competitors in field events where records were broken. Michelle Sabo broke the conference record for the 300 m. low hurdles with a time of 49.9. The 800 m. medley relay team (Michelle Sabo, Lana Stahl, Jenny McClain, and Cherri Neumann) broke the record with a time of 1:57.5 and the conference record with a time of 1:58.8. They also placed 5th at Districts with a time of 1:57.5. Holly Drescher broke the standing school record for the discus with a throw of 104'4" and placed 4th at Districts with a throw 101'11". Jenny McClain broke the school record in the 200 m. dash with a time of 26.3. She placed 1st in this race with a time of 26.5 at Districts, which allowed her to travel to state where she placed 7th with a time of 26.3.

The boys track team had a fantastic season. They ended issuing letters to eight Freshman, five Sophomores, seven Juniors, and seven Seniors. They won all but one dual meet and placed well in all the major relays, which included three team trophies. The main goal was to win the varsity conference for the third consecutive year. This was accomplished. Darren McDonough broke his high jump record with a jump of 6'5". He placed 2nd in the event at districts with a jump of 6'2" and traveled to state. He had a jump of 6'2" in preliminaries at state which didn't allow him to go to the finals. Travis Schnowske earned a medal at districts in polevault by placing 5th and the 800 m. relay team (Bryce Reed, Terry Anderson, Steve Brown, and Travis Schnowske) also earned medals at districts by placing 5th.

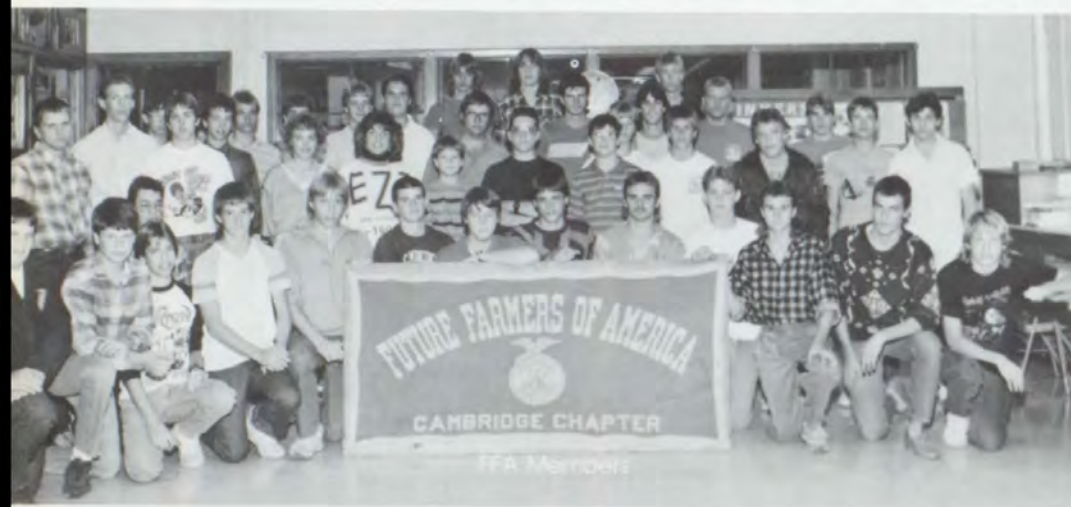

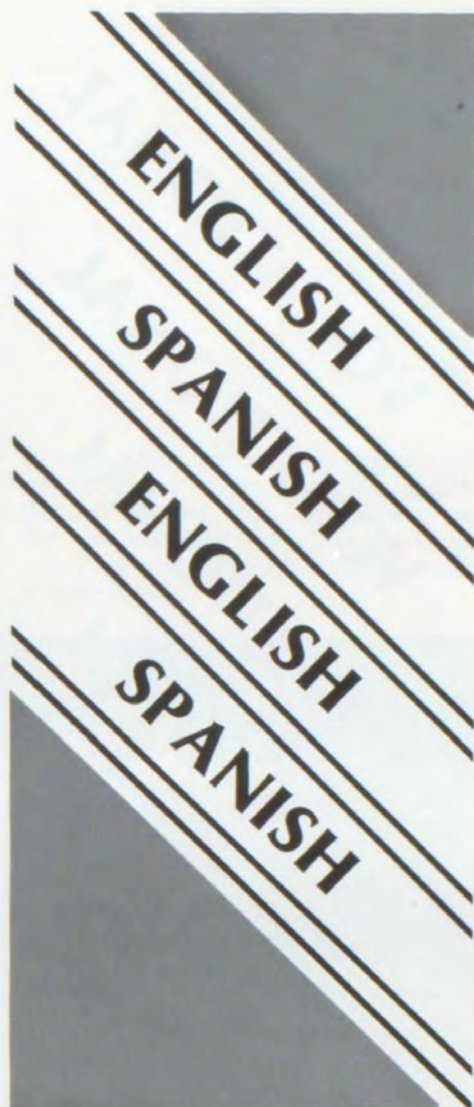

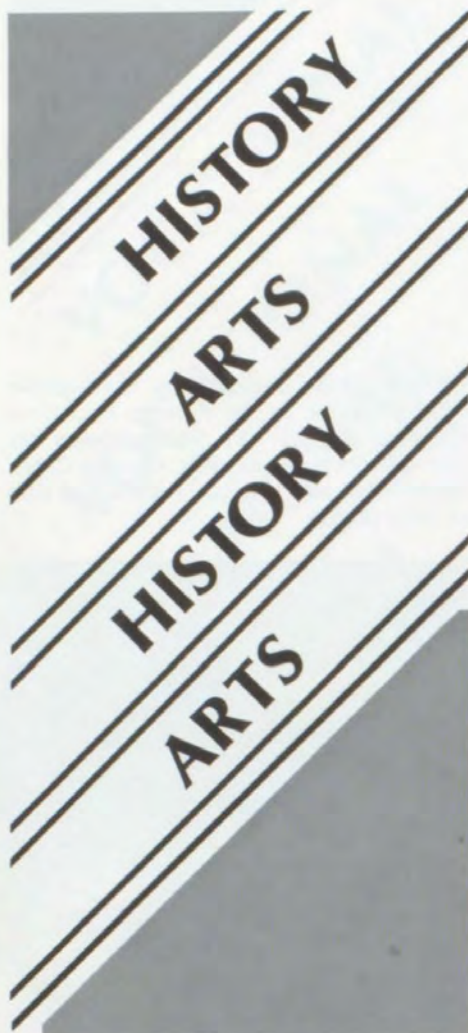

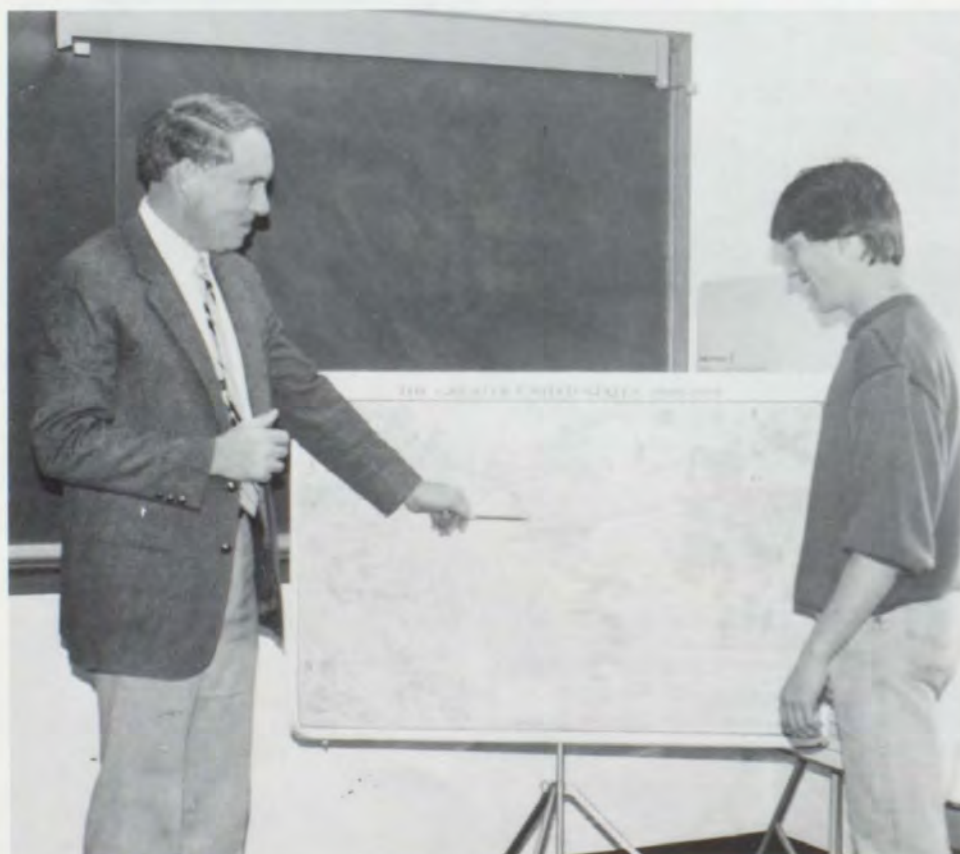

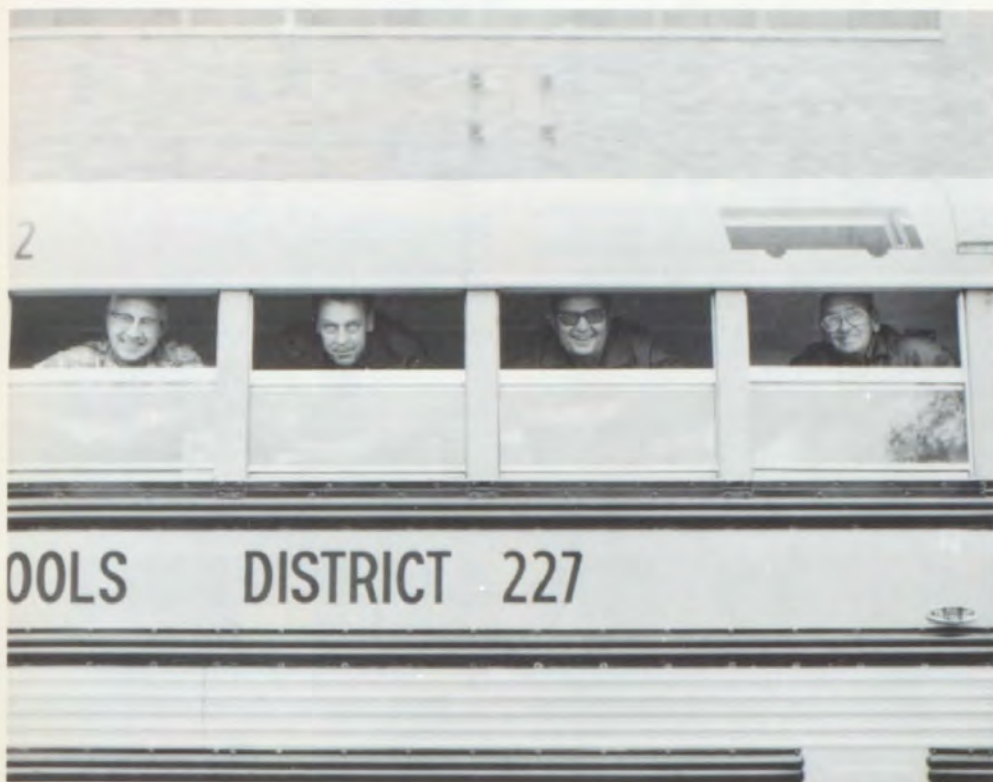
