

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



A Brief History of Cambridge School

Miss Sarah Frances Little taught the first school in Cambridge. Like everything else in the way of public gatherings in those days it was held in the court house. Miss West and Miss Allen were among the other teacher of an early day. In 1850 a building was erected, and it was sold to the Christian Church, when the old brick on College Square was put up. In 1857 there were two departments taught in the school, and the basement of the old N. E. Church was used for a school until the brick was completed. This was the first attempt at grading or dividing the schools.

The first principal was R. C. Raymond, afterwards a practicing physician, assisted by Miss Fanny Gould and Miss Lucy Brooks.

The next year, 1858, Henry P. Summer was principal. In 1859 Dr. Raymond was again principal. Then Mr. Thorpe, assisted by Miss Sarah B. Dunn. These remained until 1863, when Ira D. Marten became principal, remaining until 1866. The building up to this time contained but two rooms.

In 1866, B. F. Barge was secured as principal. Ten years afterward he was elected County Superintendent of Schools. He remained in charge until 1872. In 1868 a large frame building was built. This added two departments to the school. When Mr. Barge retired, C. I. Gruey was placed in charge. The high school course of study was established by Mr. Gruey in 1873. The first graduate was in 1875. In 1876 the building was remodeled, and three new wings were added. Following Mr. Gruey, F. A. Hyde served as superintendent for four years, 1880 to 1884.

A. G. Smith became superintendent in the fall of 1884. In 1885 the school was not conducted upon the graded plan. There was one general study hall in constant charge of one teacher, and from this the pupils went to their respective rooms for recitation. This system continued until 1888, when F. W. White became superintendent. Mr. White was here two years, 1887 to 1889, when he went to Galva.

Mr. Gruey was again superintendent during the year 1889-1890. When Mr. Gruey retired for the second time, W. C. Harding took his place, and was superintendent until 1892. From 1892-1894, Laura J. Haggart was in charge of the school, with Sue Douglas as high school principal. Miss Haggart was a quiet, unassuming and able teacher who had a personal interest in her pupils.

In the fall of 1894, Mr. E. E. Jones was secured as superintendent. Mr. Jones raised the standard of the school and increased the attendance. He aroused an interest in athletics, and had one of the best football teams in this part of the state. He also organized a High School Orchestra and helped in all movements for the general good of the community.

During the year 1900-1901, A. J. Magee was superintendent, and from 1901-1902, J. W. Cradler held that position. The next

two years, 1902-1904, Edward G. Maul was superintendent. The first Senior Class Play was then given, and class memorials were originated.

In the fall of 1904 J. M. Markel accepted the position of superintendent of Cambridge schools. The first eighth grade graduation was held during his administration. "Patron's Day" was also originated, and laboratory work in zoology was begun. It was during this administration that the first Junior reception was given.

In 1906 the new high school building was started. It was dedicated on May 10, 1907.

Prof. T. F. McCammarrah was superintendent from 1909-1912. He instigated the half year promotion plan in 1910 and it was continued until 1915. Prof. H. M. Hinkle was superintendent from 1912-1917. C. C. Foley served for one year, 1917-1918. Charles McMullen followed him in the years 1918-1924. Harley N. Rohm became principal in 1924 and holds this position at the present time. During his administration the commercial department was added to our high school. In 1928 the gymnasium was converted into a commercial classroom. The Armory Hall was used as a gym until 1936, when the Community Hall was completed. The High School uses it for basket-ball games, parties, and other activities.





Curriculum

Cambridge High School is a four year high school accredited and recognized by the State Department of Education, the University of Illinois, and the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

A graduate of Cambridge High School who has the required credits is privileged to enter any institution of higher education within the North Central States without entrance examinations. This privilege is extended throughout practically the entire United States through the recognition of the North Central States by other accrediting associations.

Graduates of Cambridge High have the assurance that their high school diplomas will be acceptable by the State Boards having to do with the granting of certificates for the various professions of medicine, dentistry, law, and others. In states where a diploma from an approved high school is required for the obtaining of a teacher's certificate, graduates of Cambridge High School will meet such a law.

Included in the Cambridge High School curriculum are the following academic subjects:

English	four years
Mathematics	three years (Algebra, one and one-half years; geometry one and one-half years)
Science	three years (general science, one year; Biology, one year; physics, one year)
Social Studies	three years (One-half years (History, two years; economics, one-half year; civics one-half year; commercial geography, one-half year)
Latin	two years

For those who wish to go on to college after graduation there is a complete college preparatory schedule. For those who wish a more general or commercial course, there are subjects that may be of more benefit for their particular calling.

Our school is to be congratulated on the excellent teaching staff that has been secured. All the teachers are extremely well qualified for their positions. Miss Westerland, our English instructor, Miss Grace Hoadley, teacher of Latin and history and Miss Raveill, commercial instructor, have all been with us for several years. Mr. Rohm, Superintendent of Cambridge High School, has done his utmost to make this school the success that it is. Last year saw the appearance of Mr. Laroy Zell as Science instructor and Mr. Raymond Johnson as Mathematics teacher and coach. This year saw the introduction of Miss Delora Whisnant as music and Art teacher. Art was introduced at Cambridge High for the first time for several years and has been met with much enthusiasm.

This year the health program has been greatly improved. Smallpox vaccination and Diphteria immunization were



nation and Diphteria immunization were sponsored by the Woman's Club. Physical examinations of high school athletes were also made possible by the action of the Board of Education. The program adopted by the school board for the past year called for the following two things:

1. The keeping of a weight-height-age chart for each child in the first eight grades.

2. A physical and dental examination for each child in the first and fifth grades at no expense to the individuals.

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BASE BALL 1938-1939

With seven men returning from last year's Championship aggregation, Coach Johnson managed to turn out another undefeated team in 1938.

The mighty Vikings opened the season by defeating Orion, 4 to 0. Stephens, our star south-paw, nearly joined the hall of fame when he pitched no-hit ball for 6 innings, only to have Anderson spoil the day with a scratch single over short.

Cambridge then went to Alpha and knocked them all over the lot for a 19 to 1 victory. Stephens continued his winning way with another one-hit game. This one hit was a home run by Frenell.

In the third game scheduled, Andover rather than play forfeited it, thus giving Cambridge three victories in as many starts.

Woodhull came to town and Johnson started his reserves. It soon became evident that the regulars were going to have to go in and win the game, as Woodhull had the benefit of a three run lead. The first team went in the fifth and pushed across five runs to bring home the bacon again.

Andover then forfeited again, and the Johnson lads were rained out at Woodhull.

The Vikings then went to Alpha and received full revenge for the only defeat handed them in four years of play. This defeat took place in 1934, when Alpha beat Cambridge for the last time 19 to 3. In 1938, however, they took the Miners into camp to the tune of 17 and 1 for a score.

This season marked a fitting close for eight seniors, who played their last baseball game for C. H. S. that evening in Alpha. In the final totals, Cambridge had a total of 53 runs to the oppositions 8. The average runs per game were 10.6 for C.H.S. and 1.6 for opponents. Stephens was the leading pitcher, having won all of the Cambridge games. Veith was the leading hitter, having an average of .533, he was closely followed by Hultman, with .539 and Dale German, with an even .500.

BASKETBALL 1938-1939

The past basketball season was in one way, successful and in another, a failure. Coach Johnson opened practice with five lettermen forming the nucleus of the squad.

The Vikings opened the season at Anawan, and in spite of two Corrigan baskets, we won the game, 34-28.

Orion then came to town, and the sharpshooting Mercermen led by Dick Johnson ace forward who handed the Vikings their worst defeat of the season. As the gun sounded, Orion led 32-18.

The C. H. S. boys next visited Alpha and lost their second straight game, this time by a 22-20 margin. Cambridge lost this game because of ineffectiveness at the free throw line.

Galva came to Cambridge for their first time in many years and was handed a 24-19 defeat. The Wildcats were stubborn, but the Vikings were not to be denied.

Cambridge then went to Wethersfield and won the hardest fought game of the year, 22-17. Calvin Veith will particularly remember this game, for as a result of a blow by one of the high-flying Geese, he lost three front teeth.

The Vikings then traveled to Prophestown and were defeated 24 to 23. After being behind 10 to 1 at the first quarter, Cambridge gained a four point lead with two minutes to go. This lead was erased by two baskets by Romans and a free throw by Randal.

In the first of two games with Geneseo, Cambridge beat the Wheelers 26-23. The Johnson boys were behind until the last minute of play when they got three quick baskets while holding Geneseo scoreless.

During the Christmas holidays Cambridge entered the Geneseo Invitational Tournament. They drew Mineral for their first game and beat them handily 26-14. In their next game they didn't fare so well, being defeated by Erie 28-31. It was some consolation however, to note that Erie went on to win the Tournament.

Geneseo's Wheelers came to town and the C. H. S. boys really got hot. They won, going away 51 to 19. This is without a doubt the worst beating Cambridge has handed Geneseo in many years.

Stephens and Veith hit the rim for 27 points between them, Dale getting 15 and Cal, 12.

Cambridge again hit their stride against Wyoming and trounced them 42-19. This marked the high spot of the team's work for the year.

Alpha next came to the house of the Vikings and took them 38-35. Again it was the old failing, free throws, that beat them, Max Plunkett, Alpha forward hit for 20 points to tear down the Vikings.

The crowning achievement of the year came on January 6, 1939. The Vikings traveled to Kewanee and beat the Boiler makers 24 to 17. Early in the second quarter Flood was chased from the game on a double foul. This excited the Johnson men to such extent that their aggressiveness stunned Kewanee and finally beat them. Max Johnson garnered 10 points to lead the Vikings to a glorious victory.

Cambridge played their second Kewanee team in a week and skinned out a 17-17 victory. Two tight game def-

ences held down the score and detracted from the interest of the game.

The next opponent was Galva, and the Vikings were trounced 38 to 30. The Roman coached men gained a 27 to 12 lead at the half. Veith, out the first half because of illness, spared a last half attack that just fell short. Nelson led this futile rally with 10 points.

The nemesis of the Vikings, Orion, came to Cambridge and again came out on the long end of a 26-17 score. Johnson, Raisbeck, and Coulter led the Mercermen.

In the last game of the scheduled season, Cambridge resumed its winning way and beat Bradford 36-16. This game was Cambridge all the way, for it gave revenge for the close game at Bradford.

This event closed the regular seasons with a total of 11 games won and 3 lost.

On February 22, Cambridge entered the District Basketball Tournament at Sheffield. They were beaten by Annawan in their first game 18-16. Perhaps the only thing that can account for the Vikings' defeat by a weaker team was over confidence, although the small floor was somewhat of a handicap too.
