## Science and Math

The math program at C.H.S. consists of Algebra I and II, geometry and a combined course of solid geometry and trigonometry, taught by Mr . Mungerson and Mr. Nordstrom. Algebra is basic to all other math courses offered. Geometry consists of analyzing plane figures along with theorems and angles. Algebra II goes deeper into the mechanics of math, giving a solid preparation for the final math courses. Solid geometry and trigonometry are recommended for Seniors who plan to enter engineering or math fields.

The science program consists of general science, biology, and chemistry and physics alternately, taught by Mr . Place and Mr. Mungerson.

The social studies program at C.H.S. includes world history, U.S. history, modern problems, and civics or government

World history, taught by Mr. Devinney, is a study of civilization from earliest times to the present time with a strong emphasis given to geographical settings. World his tory students learn that what we are today and what we have today has been handed to us down through the ages. In addition the use of the regular text for the course time is set aside for discussion of current events. This year a special study is being made of Viet Nam.
U.S. history, taught by Mr Truckenbrod, is compulsory for all students. It is taken the junior year. U.S. students study our country from the early beginning until today

when it is a leading world power. The Civil War, industrial revolution, rulings of presidents, and world wars are just a few of the areas studied in U.S. One six weeks is devoted to the study of the U.S. Flag, the Declaration of Independence, the Australian ballot system, and the U.S. and Illinois Constitutions. This six weeks goes deep into the mechanics of our government.

Modern problems is a study of current social, economic, and political problems. Areas of study include culture, morals, public opinion, income tax, insurance, social disintegration, and communism. Various text books are used, but much of the information is obtained from current publications.

Civics is an extensive study of the structure of the government.

## Vocational

Acquiring skills and knowledge needed to perform the duties of a good family member is a continous process. The vocational program at C.H.S. is designed to accomplish the objective.

The home economics program, directed by Miss Woolsey, consists of home ec I and II and family living. In home ec I and II emphasis is given to many phases of home and family care. The family living class deals with family relations in marriage and raising a family .

The ag courses, taught by Mr . Whorley, deals with farm practice work, livestock judging, parliamentary procedures, and laboratory work.

The industrial arts, taught by Mr . Palmer, study mechanical drawing, metal work, electricity, and woodwork.

## Commercial

Commercial courses are a must for those planning to enter the business field after graduation from C.H.S. Typing I, shorthand, bookkeeping, and office practice are the commercial courses offered. All freshmen are required to take one semester of personal typing, in which they learn basic typing skills. Typing I is a more advanced typing class in which the student learns to improve his accuracy and speed. Various business forms are also studied. One year of typing is required before taking shorthand. In shorthand the student learns to take dictation, transcribe letters, and use the dictaphone. Bookkeeping class teaches students how to keep an accurate balance and work sheet, and how to use different types of journals. Neatness is required in bookkeeping. In Office practice the study of actual office work, the student, learns to file, make out payrolls, send telegrams and many other office musts.

## Languages

Cambridge High School's language department is excellent. The English department is headed by Mrs. Kenward, Mrs. Jonson, Mrs. Bjorling, and Mrs. Peterson.

The freshman make an extensive study of literature, as well as a good review of grammar. During the freshman year, these English students read GREAT EXPECTATIONS and the ODYSSEY. Sophomores continue their extensive review of grammar. They also read SILAS MARNER and JULIUS CAESAR. The juniors put all of their grammar review into practical use of composing themes and research papers. Juniors also take an extensive study of American literature. The seniors work hard at many things . They study Shakespeare and make an over all review of grammar and vocabulary.

Students at C.H.S. are also very privileged to have an excellent Spanish department headed by Mrs. Decker. The excellent Spanish teacher gives the students a good start in the grammar and composition of the Spanish language. Sophomores continue learning grammar and begin translating literature.

They have become acquainted with pen and ink lettering, stenciling, ceramics and many of the basic elements of design. Painting, oil and watercolors, was greatly enjoyed as their spring "out-of-doors" class was initiated. Miss Koehne is also the Viking Annual sponsor.
